

Festive Milestone for Annual Cosgrave Awards

Cosgrave honoree **Dr. Joanne Brecher** Rosenberg of Corona del Mar, CA., brought down the house with her award acceptance when she said:

“Medical costs today are exorbitant. Medicine can cost thousands of dollars a month, particularly for anyone with a chronic disease. It was much less expensive 16 years ago. Congress has allowed this increase in cost. It is time to change this broken system!”

Joanne, who attended Finch from 1949 to 1953, is a veteran like her husband, of 35 years in the medical field. She is retired from general practice and internal medicine, while her husband, Dr. Robert Rosenberg, specialized in urology.

Joanne was one of six women recognized at the 15th annual Jessica Cosgrave Lifetime Achievement Awards, presented by the Finch College Alumnae Association May 19, 2009, at the Cosmopolitan Club. Also honored were:

About 100 guests attended the Cosgrave Awards, expanded to a weekend of festivities to mark the 15th milestone. More than \$10,000 was raised for Finch College scholarships, which help women complete four years of college after graduating from a two-year institution. Funds also go toward the Finch Scholar program, managed in partnership with the New York Women's Foundation. It provides part-time experience at the foundation offices for a college undergraduate.

where she worked with Diff for 25 years, and **Sylvaine Millet Lambert**, from Limoges, France. Isabelle and Sylvaine attended with **Yusuke Morishita**, Diff's dear friend and companion.

Foremost on everyone's mind was the spirit of the late **Dr. Margaret Maxwell** (1913-2007), beloved history professor who inspired the rebirth of the alumnae association in 1993 and the founding of the Cosgrave Awards in 1995.

In accepting their awards, each of the honorees laced their words with a deep fondness for Finch and often a sense of humor.

Joanne Rosenberg told about her piano teacher, Henri Deering, beginning each lesson with a glass of sherry. She also was among several students who spent a month in an upper floor dormitory apartment, learning to cook, clean and manage children (borrowed for the day) on an expense account "that today would be equivalent to welfare".

"But I left Finch with a core of self-confidence that would not be denied," she said. "In 35 years of medical practice I was never bored and never sued."

Speaking for their mother, Helen Platt, who is to celebrate her 87th birthday in November, were Lincoln Norton and Hartley Platt du Pont. Helen Platt has the distinction of being an alumna of Finch (Class of '41), a teacher (1970-71) and the mother of an alumna, Lynn Norton (1962-63). Hartley said it was an emotional moment when she and her family learned that her mother was to be honored. Hartley rides horses daily with her mother, who claims she was born on a horse and even took one with her to Finch, boarded it and rode every

day in Central Park. Several of Helen's seven children are accomplished artists like their mother, who studied under Leon Kroll and Louise Stinnett at Finch.

"Louise Stinnett came to the farm a lot," said Lincoln, who grew up at Hartley Farms, stretching across miles of Morris County, N.J., and family-owned since 1900.

Finch was so strong academically, said Phyllis Heard, that when she transferred to Columbia University from Finch in 1946 for her B.A. degree, Columbia took all her credits without question.

Phyllis returned to Finch as a liaison secretary for President Roland R. De Marco.

"That sounded like an elegant title but running a movie projector at times wasn't all that elegant," she said.

In assisting with social activities for the students, Phyllis matched them for dates with West Point cadets. She loved working with young people at Finch and applied this interest to many of her volunteer projects, which continue today. She served as president of the Finch Alumnae Association in 1953 and was on the board when the college closed in 1975. She often commutes from Nashville to



New York, where she was born and grew up and served as president of the Junior League in the 1960s. Accompanying her to Cosgrave were her daughter and son-in-law, Elizabeth and Robert Gambee of Rye, N.Y. Robert, a writer/photographer, donated several of his books on Nantucket to the Cosgrave raffle.

Susan Wright Hight shared the same maiden name with Dr. Maxwell, which prompted many family discussions, she said. Susan met her "wonderful roommate," **Freear Pollard Barnwell** (Cosgrave '05), the day she walked into Finch in 1960. They have been close friends ever since.

Susan's world extends far beyond Hartford, CT., where she is coordinator of arts in the environment at the Connecticut Children's Medical Center. Her husband, Dr. Donald (Sandy) Hight, is director of surgery and president of the center's medical staff. They are both pilots and mountain climbers, having

conquered some of the world's tallest terrain from Nepal to Russia and Africa.

After returning from Nepal in 1989, Susan was asked to go to Dharamsala, in northern India, home of the Dalai Lama and his Tibetan refugees. The Tibetan Government-in-Exile wanted her help in developing crafts to export to the United States. For two months in 1991, Susan lived in Dharamsala. She helped establish the Tibet Collection, a wholesale trading company that markets the work of Himalayan artists and sells it at the New York Gift Show and other major trade venues.

"I had to learn to step out of the box to help others," she said. "I am proud of Finch and the foundation it laid for me. The Alumnae Association forms the strongest organization of any (college alumnae) organization I know."

Alumnae from London, Hong Kong, San Francisco and New York joined **Susan Stover Hill** in celebrating her Cosgrave Award. Finch colleagues affectionately call her "Stover".

"There's a Spanish proverb that says, 'Show me who your friends are and I will show you who you are,'" she said. From the alumnae Susan drew to Cosgrave, it was easy to see she walks in good company.

Originally from Lake Forest, IL., Susan grew up in Cannes, France, where as a teen-ager she met **Joyce Nounou Reuben** (Cosgrave '08). While at Finch Susan met her future husband, Dr. Stephen Hill, now a vascular surgeon. As a self-employed nurse anesthetist, Susan

Today, Amy Margherita Puzio Kennedy is married and has two children of her own. With her daughter, Emilie has faced and overcome major personal challenges, including ovarian cancer and the death of her beloved father, Frank M. Puzio.

"My daughter once said to me: 'Getting you to adulthood was not an easy journey.'"

Emilie has developed a highly successful career as a real estate agent in Spring Lake, N.J., selling lake- and ocean-front property in the popular community, known for its Victorian architecture. She makes time to support projects such as Boys' Towns of Italy, Inc., based in New York and Rome. She is one of the first women elected to the board.

Cheryl Young Deknatel, alumnae president, launched the awards presentation with tributes to both Diff and Dr. Maxwell. Also participating was honorees' chairman **Barbara Ziet Glickman** and Finch Foundation president **Lois Moran Ziegler**. Lois mentioned several outstanding recipients of the Finch Grants (scholarships), including a veterinarian, a civil engineer and another who worked with the poor in Haiti, now studying for a master's degree at King's College in London. Among unsung volunteers donating long hours for Cosgrave were **Ceil Gavin Ainsworth** and **Marjorie Schulman**.
